Melissa Crespo (she/her/hers) is from Connecticut with Dominican, Puerto Rican and Chilean roots. She is a New York City based director of theater, opera and film. She most enjoys directing world premieres. She is also a producer, dramaturg and playwright. As a director, Melissa has developed work at New Dramatists, The Lark (RIP!), The Playwright's Center and theaters around the country & abroad. As a playwright, Melissa co-wrote Egress with Sarah Saltwick. It received the Roe Green Award Workshop Production at Cleveland Playhouse in 2019. Egress recently had a world premiere at Amphibian Stage, and will produced at Salt Lake Acting Company as an NNPN Rolling World Premiere. She is a Founding Editor of 3Views on Theater, an online theater journal conceived by The Lillys. Melissa has served as a Time Warner Fellow at WP Theater, Allen Lee Hughes Directing Fellow at Arena Stage, Van Lier Directing Fellow at Second Stage Theatre and is an alum of the Drama League Director's Project. She is a Usual Suspect at New York Theatre Workshop and received her MFA in Directing from The New School for Drama. She is a proud member of the 2021 Still Standing Artist Residency and the newly appointed Associate Artistic Director of Syracuse Stage.



Mei Ann Teo - Associate Artistic Director of New Work, Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Ashland, OR

Mei Ann Teo (they/she) is a queer immigrant from Singapore who is an artistic leader, theatremaker, filmmaker, and educator. A recent recipient of the League of Professional Theatre Women's Josephine Abady Award, Teo served for three years as the Artistic Director of Musical Theatre Factory, an artists service organization committed to dismantling oppressive ideologies towards collective liberation, and resident company of Playwrights Horizons. They are now the Associate Artistic Director of New Work at Oregon Shakespeare Festival. Teo makes theatre and film at the intersection of artistic, civic, and contemplative practice. As a director/devisor/dramaturg, they create across genres, including music theatre, intermedial participatory work, reimagining classics, and documentary theatre. Before taking the reins at Caffè Lena in 1995, she served as a fundraiser then executive director for the Massachusetts state branch of Peace Action, a nationwide, grassroots citizen's lobby. Sarah seeks to carry forward Lena Spencer's dedication to community service through music, creating friendships, careers, and harmonious connection. She has contributed articles to national music publications, freely offers herself as a mentor to emerging artists and presenters, and shares her experience as a panelist at conferences in the US and Canada.



Nancy Yao Maasbach - President of the Museum of Chinese in America, New York, NY

Nancy Yao Maasbach has served as the President of the Museum of Chinese in America (MOCA) since 2015. As the President of MOCA, Nancy has the unique privilege of combining her experiences in managing organizations, promoting arts and culture as a bridge between peoples, and executing research focused on redefining the American narrative by examining the role of Chinese Americans in U.S. history. Prior to her time at MOCA, Nancy was the executive director of the Yale-China Association, one of the oldest nonprofit organizations dedicated to building U.S.-China relations. Nancy has over twenty years of leadership experience at nonprofit organizations and for-profit management, including staff and board positions at The Community Fund for Women & Girls, International Festival of Arts and Ideas, Tessitura Network, Goldman Sachs & Co, Council on Foreign Relations, CNN, the Center for Finance and Research Analysis, and Aberdeen Standard Investments-managed closed-end funds. Nancy received her MBA from the Yale School of Management and her AB from Occidental College. She was an original member of the Here and Now Theater Company. She is a lecturer at the Yale School of Drama. Nancy is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.



C. Brian Williams – Founder and Executive Producer, Step Afrika!, Washington, DC

Brian is a native of Houston, Texas, and graduate of Howard University. He first learned to step as a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. – Beta Chapter, in the Spring of 1989. While living in Southern Africa, he began to research the percussive dance tradition of stepping, exploring the many sides of this exciting, yet under-recognized American art form and founded Step Afrika! in 1994. Williams has performed, lectured and taught in Europe, Central and South America, Africa, Asia, the Middle East, the Caribbean and throughout the United States. He is the founder of the monumental Step Afrika! International Cultural Festival in Johannesburg, South Africa.

Through Williams' leadership, stepping has evolved into one of America's newest cultural exports and inspired the designation of Step Afrika! as Washington, D.C.'s official "Cultural Ambassador." Williams has been cited as a "civic/community visionary" by NV Magazine, a "nation builder" by the National Black Caucus of State Legislators, and a "minority business leader" by the Washington Business Journal. He is the recipient of numerous Artist Fellowships; the Distinguished Arts Award from the Coalition for African-Americans in the Performing Arts; the Pola Nirenska Award for Contemporary Achievement in

Dance. He is also featured in Soulstepping, the first book to document the history of stepping. He also earned the 2008 Mayor's Art Award for Innovation in the Arts and has led the company to multiple Metro DC Dance Awards for "Outstanding New Work", "Excellence in Stage Design/Multimedia" and "Outstanding Group Performance." In 2018, Williams received the Mayor's Arts Award for Visionary Leadership from the DC Commission on the Arts and Humanities.

Ben Cameron – President of the Jerome Foundation, Minneapolis, MN

Ben Cameron was Program Director for the Arts at the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation from 2006 to 2015, where, during his tenure, the Foundation created the Doris Duke Artists Awards and received the National Medal of the Arts from President Barack Obama. He previously served as the Executive Director of Theatre Communications Group, as the Senior Program Officer for the Dayton Hudson Foundation and Manager of Community Relations for Target Stores, and as the Director of the Theater Program at the National Endowment for the Arts. He received an MFA from the Yale School of Drama, a BA with honors from UNC-CH and is a recipient of three honorary degrees.



Robert Barry Fleming – Executive Artistic Director of Actors Theatre of Louisville, Louisville, KY

Robert Barry Fleming is the Executive Artistic Director of Actors Theatre of Louisville and previously served as Associate Artistic Director at Cleveland Play House and as Director of Artistic Programming at Arena Stage. World premieres commissioned, developed and championed during this tenure at Arena include the 2017 Best Musical Tony Award winner *Dear Evan Hansen*, Karen Zacarías's *Destiny of Desire*, and the 2017 Pulitzer Prize winner, *Sweat*, by Lynn Nottage. Fleming was also a tenured professor and Chair of the University of San Diego Theatre Arts and Performance Studies Department. Live event directing and choreography credits include *Are You There?* and *Once On This*

Island (Actors Theatre of Louisville), and productions at Cleveland Play House, Oregon Shakespeare Festival, and Tantrum Theater.



Lisa Richards Toney – President and CEO of the Association of Performing Arts Professionals (APAP), Washington, DC

Lisa Richards Toney has more than 20 years of experience leading a range of small and large arts and humanities organizations, managing change, and building stability. Prior to leading APAP, she served as Executive Director of the Abramson Scholarship Foundation, Deputy Director and later Interim Executive Director of the DC Commission on the Arts and Humanities, as well as other leadership roles at the Pen/Faulkner Foundation; The American Place Theatre, and as the first Executive Director of the Debbie Allen Dance Academy. She received her Bachelor of Arts Degree in Drama and English as a Presidential Scholar from Spelman College, a Master of Arts Degree in Arts Education from New York University, and a Vilar Arts Management Fellowship with the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Under his leadership, YPT was awarded commissions from the White House, the Kennedy Center and the Smithsonian Institution while establishing a resident company and an advisory panel of nationally recognized playwrights. From 2010-2012, David received the Meyer Foundation's \$100,000 Exponent Award for visionary leadership of a nonprofit, the National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Award from the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities and the Hands On Greater DC Cares' Essence of Leadership Award. David is a Directing Fellow of the Drama League of New York, a past President of the League of Washington Theatres, a member of Leadership Greater Washington and a National Arts Strategies Chief Executive Fellow. David received his MFA from New York University, Tisch School of the Arts and his BA in English Literature/Russian language from Dickinson College, magna cum laude, Phi Beta Kappa.
